3 Ways Your Veterinary Hospital Can Help Wildlife

Most veterinary staff working in general practice periodically receive calls regarding orphaned, injured, or nuisance wildlife. Sometimes, finders, or rescuers, will simply show up at the hospital with a wild animal that needs care. These 3 tips will help your hospital be better prepared for wildlife emergencies.

Know local resources for helping wildlife. You can refer clients to these resources directly when they have questions or concerns. Phone numbers to keep on hand include:

- Local Wildlife Rehabilitators and Wildlife Rehabilitation Centers
- Humane Eviction Companies
- Animal Control Departments willing to help with wildlife



Reach out to a wildlife rehabilitation center or local wildlife rehabilitator. Ask about the ways your veterinary hospital can directly assist them. This may include:

- Serving as a drop off location for animals to be triaged and then transported
- Offering humane euthanasia to animals who are fatally sick and/or injured

• Offering veterinary services for free or at a discounted rate to wildlife rehabilitators for the animals going through rehabilitation.

Educate Clients. Wild animals often need rehabilitation because of the actions of humans. Some tips you can give to clients to keep wildlife safe include:

- Keeping cats inside. Cats are very destructive to local wildlife.
- Avoiding rat poison. Not only is it bad for dogs, but it is bad for the wildlife who eat the poisoned rodents.
- Educating about humane eviction, especially during baby season to avoid the mother being trapped and removed while leaving her young behind.
- Placing decals on windows to prevent birds from flying into them.
